Holy Week at Clair





Message from the Pastor

In the boat with Jesus...

During the benediction Sunday morning, I was drawn to the architecture of the church's ceiling. We had spent the morning talking about Jesus calming the wind and waves so that he and the disciples did not drown during a nighttime crossing of the Sea of Galilee. We were reminded that all will be well as long as Jesus is in the boat with us. And, here we were in a sanctuary with a ceiling built to resemble the keel of a boat! In fact, the boat has been a metaphor for the church for centuries.

I did some research and think you'll be interested in what I found. Joby Provido has written:

"When we see the exposed beams, we are meant to see the keel (bottom) of a ship. Imagine a ship stripped of everything except the bottom structure, then turn it upside-down and stick it to the ceiling. That is what we are intended to see. Some churches have the exposed beams running the entire length of the church, and if not, it is usually found above the nave. The nave is the area where the pews are located. In large churches, the nave is flanked on the left and right by smaller aisles."

Provido goes on to write, "The symbolism of the ship comes from one of the metaphors of the Church. In the story of the Great Flood in Genesis, only those who were in Noah's Ark were saved from death. It foreshadows the Church as an ark that 'navigates safely in this world' to bring those of faith safely to their destination of eternal life." It isn't surprising, then, that the boat became an early Christian symbol and found its way into church architecture and terminology.

As our friend Ryan Ruch likes to remind me, there are lots of boats and fishing stories in the Bible. Ryan is passionate about making nets, one of which is gracing our altar right now. Many episodes in Jesus' life are linked with boats. He called his first disciples from their fishing boats to come and follow him, to no longer catch fish, but people. During Sunday's worship we were reminded of Jesus' power as he calmed the wind and the waves. Even though the disciples were terrified, Jesus was in charge and would protect them. As long as Jesus is in the boat with us, we will be alright. That goes for our individual lives – inviting and including Jesus in every aspect of our daily life – as well as our life as Clair United Methodist Church. As long as we keep our eyes on Jesus, all will be well. We'll stay afloat in our life of ministry and service for and with and to our neighbors around us AND in our growth as Jesus' disciples.

Next time you are in the sanctuary, look up and be reminded of the symbolism of being in the boat with Jesus! Peace and blessings, Friends, as we look to Palm Sunday, Holy Week, and Easter morning!
